World Water Academy provided a staff member for the NWP South Africa Platform on a part-time base for half a year. In this period the Platform organized a common Dutch delegation for the WISA conference in Cape Town (May 2012). This included the elaboration of the program, marketing & PR of the event, logistical arrangements, agreements and contacts with South African partners. Also input on cooperation agreements, facilitation of discussions, policy making and Young Water professional engagement was part of the job.

The quality and availability of appropriately qualified and experienced workers is more and more seen as a necessary condition to sustain economic growth of South Africa. The South African water sector is really aware of the needs, but is lacking in the practical translation towards a structured programme to address the needs. This project aims to give an advice on three interrelated topics: water education, training and skills development, to improve the building of capacity for water management in South Africa and Africa.

**World Water Academy** provided the project management and the Dutch knowledge and expertise of the Dutch Water Sector, concerning water education and training. The result was presented in a report and provided an implementation plan proposing 20 projects. The project was presented and discussed at the WISA (Water Institute Southern Africa) conference 2012 in Cape Town.

The staff of a Catchment Management Agency (CMA), has to work in a new organization with a –technical– staff and a governing board. These different roles ask for a good communication between both.

**World Water Academy** designed and delivered a three days course on strategic thinking and governmental sensitivity for the staff of CMA Inkomati and CMA Breede-Overberg The project focussed on the interaction between the staff and the board to strengthen the CMA staff. The Dutch experience was exchanged with de CMA staff members by using interactive teaching methods.

South Africa is changing towards sustainable water resource management for the benefit of all people. Goal is to improve the socio-economic situation by a more equitable allocation, better use of water and easier access to water. The National Water Act foresees a decentralisation and an establishment of Catchment Management Agencies (CMA). The project focuses on capacity building in order to empower the new CMAs.

World Water Academy developed an eight days seminar for the CMA board members and their stakeholders. The seminar contributed to their governing skills and taught them how to be a representative and an ambassador of the CMA. Attention was paid on vision and mission, corporate and cooperative governance, planning and control cycle and the code of conduct. The results of the seminars (like focus on stakeholders, identity of the board) were integrated in the business plan.
